POLICY TO GIVE PREFERENCE TO HAWAIIAN APPLICANTS

Kamehameha Schools’ policy is to give preference to applicants of Hawaiian ancestry to the extent permitted by law. If you would like to be considered for this preference, your Hawaiian ancestry must be verified by Kamehameha’s Ho’oulu Verification Services. Please work directly with the Ho’oulu Verification Services staff to complete your ancestry determination as soon as possible and preferably no later than the application deadline of February 15, 2025. SUMMER MEDICAL FORMS

Our summer program is a rigorous program requiring healthy learners. If your keiki is invited to attend, you are **REQUIRED** to complete the following to confirm enrollment:

- Health Summary
- TB Risk Assessment

In addition, Continental US and International students are **REQUIRED** to have the following:

- Kamehameha Schools Physical Evaluation Form dated on or after January 1, 2024
- Current immunization record.

A few courses **REQUIRE** a KS Physical Evaluation Form dated on or after January 1, 2024 and current immunization record. Courses with these medical requirements are noted in the course description. If your keiki will be participating in one of these courses, you will be notified of the additional medical requirements.

Details on how to complete and submit these requirements can be found on the form which you can view here: <https://www.ksbe.edu/malama-ola/forms> The deadline for submission will be provided upon acceptance into the program. The deadline is generally three weeks after the date of invite. Submission of medical forms alone does not confirm enrollment to the program.

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

The Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended, prohibits discrimination against individuals with physical or psychological disabilities. It is the policy of KS to make its programs, services, and activities accessible to a qualified person with a disability, unless there is a fundamental alteration in the nature of the program or service, undue hardship, or the student poses a direct threat to themselves, or to others. A “qualified person with a disability” refers to an individual with a disability who is otherwise qualified to participate in any given school, program, or activity.

COURSE CHANGES/WITHDRAWALS

This year students will be invited to summer school in two rounds. Invite letters will be sent via email to parents/guardians. The email will explain steps to complete registration, including enrollment form, tuition payment and any applicable medical requirements. Course change and withdrawal requests will be accepted during that time. After the identified payment deadline, a fee of \$50 will be charged for any course change or withdrawal requests. Full tuition is charged, without refund, for any withdrawal requests after 4:00 p.m. on June 6, 2025.

The above fees will be charged for course changes and withdrawals and are NOT COVERED by financial aid. Early notification of your child’s cancellation is requested so that spaces may be filled with waitlisted students. Withdrawal requests must be submitted via the online form provided in the confirmation email. All refunds will be processed starting June 16, 2025.

Course change requests are not guaranteed and are based on availability. Course change requests must be submitted via the online form provided in the confirmation email.

PAYMENT- ALL STUDENTS

In April all registered students will receive a confirmation letter with payment instructions. Payment must be made using the link provided via email and by the deadline stated on the invoice. Payment may be made from a savings or checking account. Credit cards are accepted and will be charged a service fee. A \$30 processing fee will be charged for any payment returned by the bank or financial institution. No payments will be accepted at the Summer School Office, or by phone.

ACADEMIC POLICIES

Student Evaluation and/or Credits

- I. Students in Grades 1 -6
Classes are for enrichment only. Credit is not awarded. Report cards and evaluations are not issued. Attendance is taken and a maximum of five (5) days absent, for any reason, is allowed.
- II. Students in Grades 7-8
Grades will be posted in Infinite Campus. Students will receive letter grades of A-F for morning non-sports classes. Sports classes are graded as Pass/No Pass. Students' grades will be affected if they miss more than five days of school. Grades may not be issued to students missing six or more days of class. Classes are for enrichment only and credit is not awarded.
- III. Students in Grades 9-12
Grades will be posted in Infinite Campus. Students will receive credit for successful completion of a course (D- grade or better). Teachers' individual grading practices are outlined in their course summaries. Students exceeding three (3) days absent will not receive credit and may be disenrolled from Summer School.

Course Credits:

Credit courses are offered at an accelerated pace. Each day is the equivalent of approximately one week of class instruction during the regular school year. Students who are absent more than three days will not receive credit or a grade for the course.

TRANSPORTATION

Shuttle Bus/Terminal Service

Grades 1-4

There will be **no shuttle bus/terminal service for students in grades 1-4**. Summer school students not registered for country bus service will need to be dropped off and picked up before and after classes. Drop-off supervision begins at 6:45 a.m. Car pick-up begins at 11:45 a.m.

Grades 5-12

Students in grades 5-12 may be dropped off at the terminal and will be shuttled up to campus and dropped off at designated shuttle points for their grade level.

Student Drivers

Students driving to school must register with the High School Office on the first day of school to obtain a parking permit. Drivers will need to produce a valid driver's license, safety check, registration, and no-fault insurance for the vehicle they are obtaining a parking permit for. All parking permits are kept on file with the KS Security Office. Student drivers are expected to observe all traffic signs and notices. Failure to comply will result in the loss of campus parking privileges.

Country Bus Service

Students residing in the Leeward, Windward, North Shore and Hawai'i Kai areas may request bus transportation service. Seats are limited. To request bus service, please complete the transportation section on the online application form.

Bus Fees are \$150.00 one-way or \$300.00 round trip.

Bus cards are provided on the first day of school. Students must bring this card to school each day. Lost cards must be replaced within 1 school day. Report lost cards to your kumu or the unit office.

Temporary bus passes are provided while a replacement card can be printed and issued to the respective Unit offices for distribution.

Students riding home on the country buses should not request afternoon courses since the buses depart campus at noon.

After a summer school application is submitted, changes to bus requests can be made through May 23, 2025 by emailing kapalamasummerschool@ksbe.edu. No changes will be allowed after the 23rd so that rosters can be confirmed, and bus cards can be printed before the start of summer school.

2025 INTRODUCTION TO SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH - Selected students will earn 0.5 Honor Science Research (HSR) credit in this introduction to the fundamentals of scientific research. Students will learn about scientific research methods and techniques, research ethics, and the importance of keeping a clear and detailed notebook. They will be introduced to basic research principles, developing a testable hypothesis, designing a project to test that hypothesis, analyzing the data, and presenting the findings in written and oral form. Significant figures, sources of error, and simple statistical tests (linear regression, t-tests) will be discussed. Students will learn to conduct literature searches for original and review journal articles. Scientific writing will be emphasized; i.e., how to write an abstract and the main sections of a scientific paper (introduction, materials and methods, results, discussion, and conclusion). The students will become familiar with basic laboratory procedures such as pipetting, sterile techniques, and how to use a hemocytometer. They will be instructed on mammalian cell culture, cytotoxicity, DNA extraction, and polymerase chain reaction (PCR). Various diverse topics in science (astronomy, environmental science, brain anatomy and function, etc.) will be described. Each student will identify an area of interest and begin developing a research project to be continued and completed in the HSR course during the coming school year. If possible, students will begin their projects in the summer. This course is required for all students who are new to the HSR program and will be enrolled in HSR during the 2025-26 school year.

SUMMER 2025 DIGITAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

ELIGIBLE STUDENTS

The course is taught through real world case studies, where students take on the role of a chemist working with a team of experts to investigate medical or environmental issues. In these case studies, students learn about topics like atomic structure, phases of matter, stoichiometry, and thermodynamics in scenario-based learning where they complete projects that require critical thinking, making and testing predictions, application, and synthesizing multiple concepts to succeed. ***This online course is offered via ASU Prep Global. While coursework is completed asynchronously, students must complete two (2) synchronous discussion based assessments and one semester exam per segment.***

In Part B, students will explore major historical events around the world. In the first unit, they'll explore the causes and effects of the Industrial Revolution, the spread of nationalism in Europe, and the Russian Revolution. In the second unit, they'll analyze imperialism in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries and examine the causes and consequences of World War I. In the third unit, they'll study World War II, analyzing the factors that started the war and the impact of the war. In the fourth unit, they'll explore the rise and fall of communism in the Soviet Union and China and learn about the Cold War between the United States and the Soviet Union. In the fifth unit, they'll analyze the effects of decolonization in Southeast Asia and Africa. Students will also study the modernization of China and the rise of nationalism in the Middle East. In the last unit, they'll explore economic globalization and evaluate the benefits and challenges of living in the modern world. ***This online course is offered via ASU Prep Global. Students explore anatomy and physiology pertaining to medical scenarios and gain an understanding of the disease process, demographics of disease, and pharmacology. Additional learning experiences include studying current issues in health and medicine, building a community-service action plan, interviewing a patient, and creating a new mystery case. **This online course is offered via GOA and has BOTH asynchronous and synchronous components.
